Dear Chairman Harkin and Senator Specter,

We write to request a set-aside of \$7.5 million within the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Center for Injury Prevention and Control, for the expansion of the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS) for Fiscal Year 2009 (FY09).


Currently active in 17 states, NVDRS collects and links data from public health, law enforcement, medical examiners and social service agencies to develop effective strategies to prevent violent death, including those caused by suicide, homicide, child abuse and domestic violence. NVDRS also enables states to better evaluate existing programs, thereby assuring the most efficient and effective use of violence and suicide prevention dollars.

Each year, more than 50,000 Americans suffer violent death. Despite this staggering loss of life, most communities lack data about the circumstances of these deaths. Through its coordinated network of state-based surveillance systems, NVDRS enables participating states to collect uniform, detailed information about violent deaths – information that ultimately can be used to help save lives. NVDRS also enables states to better evaluate existing programs, thereby assuring the most efficient and effective use of violence and suicide prevention dollars.

While NVDRS is beginning to strengthen violence and suicide prevention efforts in the 17 participating states, many other states have been turned away due to funding shortfalls. The provision of \$7.5 million for NVDRS in FY 2009 will enable the system to expand to additional states and continue its incremental growth toward national implementation.

Thank you for your consideration of our request. We believe that support for NVDRS is highly cost-effective and invaluable to the long-term success of local efforts to better understand, and ultimately reduce, violent death in our communities.
